




#### **New Bursary**




### The Ages Foundation Travel Awards



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### **Independent Auditor's Report**

## To the Board of Directors of CIP/ICU Planning Student Trust Fund

#### **Report on the Financial Statements**

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of CIP/ICU Planning Student Trust Fund, which comprise the balance sheet as at December 31, 2017 and the statements of operations and cash flows for the year then ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

#### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and for such internal controls as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal controls relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal controls. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis of our qualified audit opinion.

#### Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many charitable organizations, the Trust Fund derives revenue from donations, the completeness of which is not susceptible of satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of this revenue was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Trust Fund. The audit opinion on the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2016 was also qualified because of the possible effects of this limitation of scope. Therefore we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to donations revenue, excess of revenue over expenses for the year ended December 31, 2017 and 2016, and assets as at December 31, 2017 and 2016 and net assets at both the beginning and ending of the December 31, 2017 and 2016 years.

#### Qualified Opinion

In our opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion Paragraph, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of CIP/ICU Planning Student Trust Fund as at December 31, 2017 and the results of its operations and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

### CIP/ICU Planning Student Trust Fund Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

#### **December 31, 2017**

#### Nature of the Organization

The Trust Fund is incorporated under the Canada Corporations Act as a not-for-profit corporation, is a registered charity and as such is exempt from income taxes. The Trust Fund was continued under the Canada Not-for-profit Corporations Act on September 23, 2014. The purpose of the Trust Fund is to provide annual scholarships to deserving students enrolled in the Canadian Institute of Planner's recognized planning schools.

#### **Basis of Presentation**

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and are in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles.

#### **Financial Instruments**

#### Measurement of financial instrument

Financial instruments are financial assets or liabilities of the Trust Fund where, in general, the Trust Fund has the right to receive cash or another financial asset from another party or the Trust Fund has the obligation to pay another party cash or other financial assets.

The Trust Fund initially measures its financial assets and liabilities at fair value, except for certain non-arm's length transactions which are measured at the exchange amount.

The Trust Fund subsequently measures all its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost.

Financial assets and financial liabilities measured at amortized cost include cash, short-term investment, government remittances receivable and accounts payable and accrued liabilities.

Unless otherwise noted, it is management's opinion that the Trust Fund is not exposed to significant credit, liquidity or interest risks arising from these financial instruments.

#### Impairment

Financial assets measured at cost are tested for impairment when there are indicators of impairment. The amount of the write-down is recognized in excess of revenues over expenses. The previously recognized impairment loss may be reversed to the extent of the improvement, directly or by adjusting the allowance account, provided it is no greater than the amount that would have been reported at the date of the reversal had the impairment not been recognized previously. The amount of the reversal is recognized in excess of revenue over expenses.

#### Transaction costs

The Trust Fund recognizes its transaction costs in excess of revenue over expenses in the period incurred. However, financial instruments that will not be subsequently measured at fair value are adjusted by the transaction costs that are directly attributable to their origination, issuance or assumption.

### CIP/ICU Planning Student Trust Fund Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

#### December 31, 2017

#### **Use of Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Estimates are used in provisions for accrued liabilities. Actual results could differ from management's best estimates as additional information becomes available in the future.

#### **Revenue Recognition**

The Trust Fund uses the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Unrestricted investment income is recognized as revenue when earned.
